The Solidarity Center's headquarters in Washington, DC is offering in-person internships to undergraduate and graduate students and recent university/college graduates during the summer 2023. Solidarity Center internships provide a great opportunity to work for social justice globally.

Interns are required to work full-time (35 hours per week), 5 days a week, for 10 weeks. Work will be conducted from the Solidarity Center's headquarters office in Washington, DC. Full-time interns will receive a \$6,000 stipend during their internship.

Please note, COVID-19 vaccinations and boosters are mandatory for all employees and interns.

Position: Migration and Forced Labor Programs Intern

Location: Washington, DC

Time-period: June-August 2023, full-time (35 hours per week, 5 days a week, 10 weeks)

Position Description: The intern will assist the migration/forced labor program with the following:

Responsibilities:

- 1. Research: Carry out research from primary and secondary sources including internet research that will help inform program staff on the following topics:
- a. Wage theft of migrant workers
- b. Nexus/link between women workers, gender and migration
- c. Indicators of forced labor, linkages with trade/supply chains
- c. Other short and long-term research projects on worker rights, as needed.
- 2. Attend internal organizational and public online forums/roundtables/panel discussions addressing labor rights and related issues relevant to Solidarity Center work and draft briefings
- 3. Synthesize reports on related topics
- 4. Attend and provide support to program staff with events and workshops
- 5. Assist with writing articles for the Solidarity Center's website on related topics
- 6. Participate in Solidarity Center's Migration Working Group

Qualifications:

Demonstrated interest in social justice and worker rights.

- Background knowledge of migration and forced labor issues as they relate to human rights.
- Demonstrated excellent writing skills.
- Good qualitative and quantitative research skills
- Very good computer skills including word processing and Excel.
- Ability to meet deadlines, and work under short deadlines and quick turnaround requests.
- Familiarity with economic development issues and understanding of issues regarding implementation of international development programs.
- Good communication and interpersonal skills.
- Good judgment and ability to think creatively.
- Ability to work independently.
